Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
<p>This module utilizes diverse teaching methods including lectures, seminars, and directed reading, to facilitate learning and skill enhancement. Lectures and presentations primarily introduce key concepts and analytical techniques (LO 1), contributing to the comprehension of other learning outcomes (LOs 2-7). Individual critical assignments and analytical tasks reinforce these concepts and apply them to pertinent examples and cases (LOs 2-7). Presentation of case studies and written reflections on personal experiences are integral for deepening understanding (LO 6).</p> <p>Formative assessments include feedback on workshop exercises and outlines of group and individual assignments. Summative assessment is via a mix of assignments designed to enable students to demonstrate learning in relation to the five module learning objectives. This includes a 15-minute presentation, a 1-hour online MCQ exam, 4 hours in person games-based learning activity and 500 words written reflective essay on practice.</p> <p>Supplementary assessment: A video submission of an individual presentation and a reflective essay.</p>
