Module Aims

The aim of this module is to explore the cultural context of the midwife organisationally, nationally and globally. The module will develop knowledge of sustainability within midwifery both on a global and national level whilst also exploring historical, ethical and feminist perspectives. It will develop an understanding of the influence of underpinning theories and concepts on policy, culture, research and technology, and how this then shapes current and future midwifery care.

Outline Syllabus

Introduction to ethics, human rights and the equality act, the role of the midwife, NHS values, sociology and epidemiology in a global context, language in discourse, impact of technology in healthcare, political drivers in maternity services, community, culture and midwifery, the historical context of midwifery and maternity care, feminism and the patriarchy, medicalisation of childbirth, introduction to research, research definitions. Introduction to Born in Bradford.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

Teaching and learning will be supported by a blended approach that utilizes synchronous and asynchronous lectures and seminars to explore and develop theoretical knowledge, critical thinking and shared professional knowledge (Learning outcomes (LOs)1,2,3) Problem based learning will support exploration and application of knowledge to the professional context. Case studies, seminars and tutorials will support the application of theory to practice and shared learning (LOs 1,2,3). Formative feedback on summative work will be available from your personal academic tutor (PAT). Directed learning will support consolidation of key concepts and theory, including anatomy and physiology.

The assessment will enable you to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the subject areas and their application to midwifery practice. The annotated bibliography will demonstrate the ability to appraise research evidence that supports evidence-based practice and to begin to understand the basic principles of research and how these translate into practice (LOs1,2,3). Students will also present a plan for this as a formative assessment to their PAT (LO3)
