Human development; body systems; homeostasis; anatomy and physiology; behavioural science; anxiety; depression; cardiac diseases; dementia; stroke; providing information to patients, families and carers to support management of health conditions; active listening; clear, caring verbal and non-verbal communication; questioning; checking understanding and clarification; person centred care models; escalation of concerns and seeking help; assertiveness; nutrition; supporting sleep, privacy and dignity; documenting and reporting care; monitoring effectiveness of care and reporting changes; symptom management; capacity and best interests; learning disabilities, including The Oliver McGowan Training on Learning Disability and Autism; reasonable adjustments; safeguarding.
