Module Aims

At the Department of Sociology and Criminology we aim to provide complete programmes enhanced with theoretically informed observations and balanced by research and and experiential learning. With a sound epistemological base, students can form their own ideas about social reality, identify what they want to focus upon and strive towards impact. Skills in professionalism and enterprise cultivated throughout the programme find application in the Work Placement. In this module, students have the opportunity to collaborate with local employers and work towards the completion of set projects. The Work Placement aims to:

- Prepare students for the world of work;
- Provide opportunities to establish contacts with employers;
- Provide experience in seeking employment and effectively negotiating opportunities with employers;
- Provide experience in planning and agreeing projects that create social value;
- Provide experience of working towards creating social value and capital and evaluating concrete outcomes in collaboration with employers.

- Applying sociological knowledge and skills in real work settings;
- Negotiating the terms of employment and setting up work-related projects;
- Working individually and as part of a team;
- Organisational and time-management skills;
- Evaluation skills;
- Transferrable innovation, creativity, and professionalism skills.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

Learning on the work placement takes place in the context of real world experience, and in particular in partnership with employers and work providers. The work placement project will outline the work placement experience, the project undertaken and completed, its outcomes and evaluation against set aims and objectives. The projects needs to take into consideration employer feedback and expectations, as well as employability, professionalism and enterprise principles taught on the programme. The workshops will monitor progress and provide guidance and supervision.

In the rare occasion when the placement doesn't work out, for example if you cannot secure a contract or if the provider runs into difficulties, you will still need to produce a report. Having surveyed the job market at Bradford or elsewhere you will outline a clear pathway for your career demonstrating feasible outcomes and the method with which they will be achieved.
